


# Unlocking the secret to success



## **Learning to cope, learning to survive difficult circumstances**

Students at West Learning Center presented a stage performance based on the book “A Long Walk to Water,” which tells the story of a young boy who survived the brutal civil war in South Sudan and later returned to teach his people how to drill wells to produce safe drinking water. Using art, music and theatrics, students were able to draw connections between the difficulties overcome in the story and those they may face in their own lives.



# Unravelling the science of the crime scene

It's called forensic entomology, and while it can be smelly and a bit unnerving, it is step No. 1 when the investigation leads to the unidentifiable remains of a victim. Pictured, students in the criminal justice program are sent into the woods in search of decaying remains (animal parts donated by a local butcher) to gather and document evidence and estimate the post-mortem interval (time of death).
