# Collaborative Lesson Planning

One of the primary curricular goals of library media specialists is collaboration. Whether this is asynchronous collaboration by integrating classroom content into a fixed-schedule library lesson or direct collaboration with a subject-area teacher, librarians seek to make the

inquiry and research skills we teach relevant by anchoring them in grade-level content.

Finding the time to collaboratively plan a joint lesson can be challenging. Enter Common Curriculum: www.commoncurriculum.com It requires the creation of a free account; once logged in, you can

modify various lesson planning

templates, invite colleagues to

view, comment, and edit your lessons, and save/copy/print plans. If you are looking for a web-based platform for organizing your lesson plans with the option share and collaborate with a group of colleagues, Common Curriculum may be your solution.



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## School Spotlight: Windsor Middle School

Librarian **Terri Brandt** and Social Studies teacher **Stefanie Olbrys** recently collaborated to bring the experience of immigrants arriving at Ellis Island to life for 8th grade students.

To establish background knowledge, Terri and Stefanie used graphs, infographics, pictures and videos, audio clips and newspaper articles.



Students closely read selected texts, created accompanying Prezis, then taught their classmates about what they had learned.

Next, Terri and Stefanie created an immersive experience for their students. Beginning in "steerage", students made their way up the stairs to "Ellis Island" (the library). When they arrived, they assumed the identity of a real immigrant who had the same last name. As students moved through the arrival process they viewed pictures, listened to readings and audio clips, and were asked questions about how they would feel and react. Some students were even detained and subjected to an

interrogation! They wrote journal entries after each experience. To conclude the unit, Terri and Stefanie will guide students through an examination of current immigration news.
What an excellent example of powerful library/classroom collaboration!



#### School Spotlight: Homer Brink/Maine Memorial (ME)

In a recent lesson, librarian **Carrie Randall** led her 5th grade students through an investigation of library types and organization. First, Carrie facilitated a discussion about the difference between public and school libraries. Topics included the definition of "infotainment", users of each library type, and research needs. Next, Carrie guided students through a close read of two pro/con

articles about library re-organization and doing away with Dewey Decimal. After reading, students debated the major points of each, using evidence from the article to support their opinion.

Last, students brainstormed other possible ways of organizing the library. This lesson inspired students to think critically about the

purpose of library organization, gain a deeper understanding about the types of information found at a library, and develop a well-supported point-of-view.

Perhaps Carrie's students will create a new and improved library organizational method with their newfound understanding!

## School Spotlight: East Middle School (Binghamton)

Students at Binghamton's East Middle recently had the chance to "meet" author Vivian Vande Velde, thanks to a collaboration between librarian Peg Gates and guidance counselor Jennifer Farrell. This year, Peg and Jennifer established the "East Side Story" book club, which was funded by a Binghamton Alumni Foundation Grant. To join the club, East Middle School students completed a reading interest survey. Club members were each loaned a Kindle loaded with the book Cloaked in Red by Vivian Vande Velde. After reading the book, the

group formulated questions for the author, designed name tags to use for the Skype session, and listened to the Author's Note in preparation for discussing the



book. During the Skype chat, Ms. Vande Velde answered questions and shared names of publishers that accept student work. East Side Story members will continue to read books on their Kindles. Possible future events include meeting a Binghamton University basketball player to discuss college recruitment (in conjunction with Feinstein's Foul Trouble), Skyping with Susquehanna Valley Middle School's book club to discuss Palacio's Wonder, and blogging with author Kate Messner.
