Common Core Connection

Inquiry Text Sets

Text Sets, while certainly not a new concept, have recently gained fresh prominence with the advent of both Common Core ELA and the new Social Studies Framework. Inquiry text sets represent a new way of thinking about a tried-and-true practice.

To create an inquiry text set, begin with your objectives in mind. What do you want students to

learn? What key information do you want them to pull from the text?

Next, gather resources that are interesting AND include the information that meets your objectives. Often, it works well to start with a compelling image/multimedia and scaffold the complexity of the text upward as students become more comfortable in the subject matter. Remember—text is not limited to the printed word. If it delivers information, it can be

considered text: audio, video, photographs, paintings, infographics, articles, maps, ephemera. The key is matching the text to the objectives—not just gathering an exhaustive pile of resources, but carefully selecting texts that work together to deepen student understanding/drive inquiry. School Spotlight: Deposit Elementary

The following is a guest post by K-12 librarian Phyllis Sanford:

I have been teaching a unit on "Internet Safety" at the sixth grade level for the past 3 years and each year have added more components. I start the unit by using the analogy of driving a car. I tell my students that a car is a great tool but without proper driver training it can be very dangerous. The Internet is the same. We need to learn strategies and skills that can help keep us safe while online.

The main resources for this unit are from the free NetSmartz Workshop (<http://www.netsmartz.org>), "an

interactive, educational program of the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children that provides age appropriate resources to teach children how to be safer on and off-line". This is a high-interest unit that promotes higher-level thinking along with lively and in-depth discussions. I am always pleased when I am able to observe students think and communicate their feelings and thoughts. Each lesson has a different focus and is accompanied by a video; we cover privacy settings, cyberbullies, gossip, revealing too much information, and social media sites.

As a culminating activity, students develop an Internet safety plan using PowerPoint. Students work in pairs or groups of three. Each student contributes and each group presents their plan to the class. So, as well as covering internet safety strategies this unit encompasses the National Technology Standards (ISTE-NETS) 1-6.

On a 6-day cycle, the unit takes about 2 months. I believe it is time well spent. I always walk away learning from my students; I am amazed by their knowledge of all the that is available online. I'm concerned by their lack of personal filters and their oblivion as to how their online activity may affect them. This unit will continue to evolve as our technology changes and it is my hope that through it I can make a difference in how my students view their online citizenship.
