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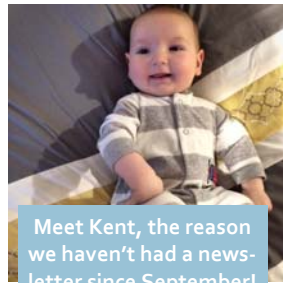
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*School Library System Updates*

At the recent New York State Council for the Social Studies conference, representatives from NYSED provided a first-glance at the new **draft** Global regents. As a part of this presentation, the proposed test format was revealed. The proposed format includes:

- All questions, multiple-

choice and written response, will be "in response to a stimulus" (AKA, a primary/secondary source)

- The short written responses will always include a question regarding "sourcing" - bias/perspective/point-of-view/purpose/reliability

- Part 3 will be an "enduring issues" essay in which the prompt remains the same but the "stimulus" or documents change. Librarians are poised to be invaluable partners in preparing students for these new exams. This is an exciting time to be a school librarian!

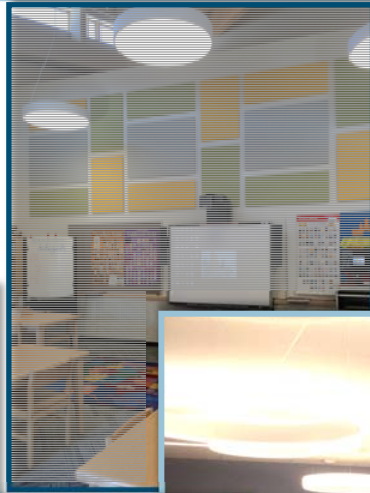
# New School Libraries!

Through her work on the award committee, Amy reached out to these

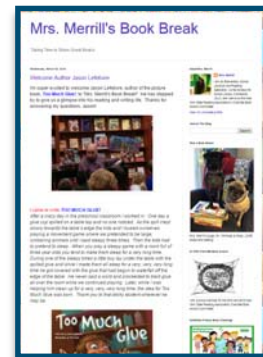

In honor of March Madness, Rita Foran (Susquehanna Valley), offered 8th graders a chance to pit robots against one another in a game called Capture the Kingdom.



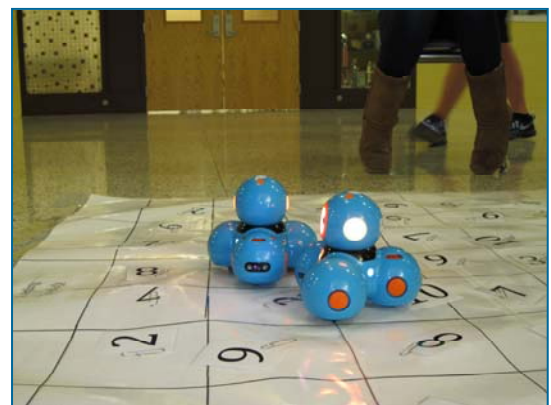
Dash, a mobile robot, was programmed using block coding (think: Hour of Code) to make it to the opposing kingdom, while picking up the greatest

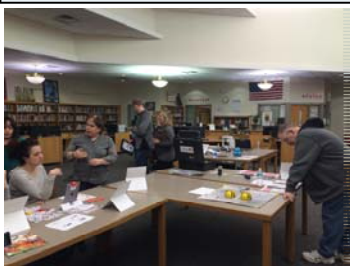


number of points.
