A message from the principal...




Climate Action School Update

During the past two months we have been busy learning about climate change and trees that live in our world. After researching trees students chose a Keystone Species tree that they felt was so important if it died off many other plants and animals would be affected. Trees chosen were Pine, Silver Maple, and the Sugar Maple. The final choice was our NYS Tree, the Sugar Maple.

We also took part in a **UN Student Survey!** The global survey results will be presented to the UN and based on these results goals will be set up to help support quality education throughout the world.

And finally we had our first international visit with our Climate Action Partners. We learned from students in India from the Mumbai Public School L.K Waghji (Cambridge). The students shared with us what they have been doing to combat climate change in Mumbai. They also shared about their Keystone Species the Tulsi plant.



VLA students get together with Mrs. Czarnecki for music classes each week on Tuesday. The first few minutes of class are spent catching up on news of the week to build a sense of class community.

Then it is on to learning about how music encompasses many subject areas. We began the year with the science of sound and how instruments are made and produce their sound. Instruments are grouped into families just like people are members of a family!

From there we moved on to music history. We studied how composers throughout history used instruments to represent characters in a musical story. We studied Danse Macabre and Peter and the Wolf. The instruments' sounds paint the picture of an object or personality of a character.

Currently, we are learning music theory. The many signs and symbols that are used to compose music all have an effect on its sound. Many decisions must be made when creating an original piece. With the help of Chrome Music Lab, VLA students are composing their own instrumental pieces. We look forward to sharing our compositions with you in the near future!
